The Edmund Rice Choral and Musical Society, founded under the auspices of the Mount Sion Past Pupils' Union, is named to honour the illustrious founder of the Christian Brothers.



Edmund Rice was born in Callan, Co. Kilkenny, on 1st June, 1762 and towards the end of the 18th century came to Waterford to join his uncle's business. He was a devout and generous young man and was involved in many charitable organisations in the city. Through this involvement, he was deeply aware of the poverty and ignorance which was the lot of many of the citizens of Waterford. After the death of his young wife in 1789, and of his uncle in 1795, his concern for the plight of the boys of the city prompted him to a greater involvement in their welfare, and in 1802 he opened his first school for them at New Street, Waterford. To-day, the name and influence of Edmund Rice is not contained within the shores of Ireland. It is strong in the English-speaking world: It is to be found in Britain, Australia and South Africa; in Newfoundland, India and the U.S.A.; in the Argentine, and in Rome itself.

In naming this Society in his honour, we are conscious of his love of music. He himself was an excellent singer, and often in the company of his friend, Tadgh Gaelach O'Suilleabhain — he would go to the Yellow House on the Cork Road, where the country people gathered to have their dances, music and poetry.

It is our hope that our Society will be a worthy monument to him and that it will grace our city for many years to come.

PHILIP BYRNE

He has been with the Society in previous productions - "The Desert Song", "The Merry Widow" and "Patience" and is equally popular with our own Society members, as with general audiences. THE COMPOSER - SIGMUND ROMBERG

Hungarian-American composer (b. 1887, Szegedin – d. 1951, New York). He was a pupil of Heuberger in Vienna, and went to the U.S.A. in 1909 where he appeared as a pianist in Hungarian orchestras. Later he gave recitals and concerts as a soloist and conducted his own works.

Romberg composed 80 operettas, beginning with "The Midnight Girl" in 1913, and ending with "The Girl in Pink Tights", produced over two years after his death. Between these a stream of tuneful scores included "The Passing Show" series (of 1914, 1916, 1917, 1918, 1923 and 1924) and the world-famous "The Student Prince" (1942), "The Desert Song" (1926) and "The New Moon" (1927). In 1926 Romberg adapted Schubert's music for the play Blossom Time (→ Lilac Time).

For many years Romberg was resident in Hollywood, where he wrote much film music, including the scores for "The Night is Young", "Sunny River" and "Up in Central Park". He also composed many popular songs. From 1942 he toured the United States with his own orchestra.

Many of his operettas were later made into films and these really made his music well-known and well loved. One of his most tuneful and romantic is, of course, tonight's show, "The New Moon".

Angela attended N.O.D.A. Operatic Summer School in Ripon for nine years. She won the Adjudicator's Award for "The New Moon" with Newcastle Glee Singers in 1980 at the Bangor Festival of



Light Opera and won the Producer's Award at the same Festival in 1984 for "Fiddler on the Roof". The same show won three other major awards including Best Overall Show.

Angela lists as her hobbies golf — she plays off a ten handicap — as well as knitting, sewing, crochet, reading, crossword puzzles, cinema and theatre. She also loves to play on the beach with her young son and loves to stroll in the Mourne Mountains.

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STORY OF THE SHOW

ROBERT MISSON, a young French aristocrat, has fled from Paris to New Orleans. His revolutionary inclinations have involved him in serious trouble. He sells himself as a bondman to M. Beaunoir, with whose daughter, Marianne, he falls in love.

Vicomte Ribaud, a great but unscrupulous detective, tracks Robert to New Orleans. In a tavern where the revolutionaries meet, Phillippe and Robert returns to the Beaunoir home to attend a ball.

Duval, captain of Beaunoir's ship, the New Moon, is a suitor for Marianne's hand and is favoured by her father, Robert, in a lucky dip, aided by his comic servant Alexander, draws the ticket which gives a dance with Marianne. He declares his love and is not by any means rebuffed. The dance is interrupted by Ribaud, who has escaped his captors. He arrests Robert, who assumes that Marianne has betrayed him.

On the New Moon for France, Robert is being taken back in custody to almost certain death. Marianne, with her maid, Julie, is also on board, ostensibly to be near Duval, whom she professes to love. When the ship is attacked by pirates, the prisoners are released to fight. Duval is about to surrender but Robert knocks out his rival and takes command. When the pirates board the ship, they turn out to be a rescue party headed by Phillippe. Thus reunited, the revolutionaries sail the New Moon to the Isle of Pines to found a colony of freedom.

After a year of hard work, Robert is in command of the prosperous colony. He and Marianne have been through a marriage ceremony, but she ignores him. Ribaud, who, for safe keeping, was taken to the island colony, has done his utmost to wreck Robert's plans and the government of his band.

When two French warships appear in the bay, Ribaud, thinking his moment has come, incites the colony to mutiny. He achieves his object by bringing Marianne and Robert together and as Robert relaxes in his new-found happiness, Ribaud strikes.

A landing party, headed by the Captain from his man-o'-war, come into the camp and Ribaud's triumph seems assured. Then comes the great denouement. Louis XVI has been deposed. France is a Republic and the colonists are citizens. Ribaud, as a professed aristocrat, is taken into custody, ostensibly doomed to the guillotine.


