Annie Get Your Gun - The Musical

Annie Get Your Gun - is a musical with lyrics and music written by Irving Berlin and a book by Herbert Fields and his sister Dorothy Fields. The story is a fictionalized version of the life of Annie Oakley (1860 - 1926), who was a sharpshooter from Ohio, and her husband, Frank Butler.

Berlin had taken on the job after the original choice, Jerome Kern, collapsed and died suddenly. It is said that the showstopper song, "There's No Business Like Show Business", was almost left out of the show altogether because Berlin, wrongly, got the impression that the producers Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, did not like it. The original 1946 production was a hit and had long runs in both New York and London, spawning many revivals, a 1950 film version and television versions. Other songs that became hits include "Doi'n What Comes Natur'lly", "You Can't Get A Man With A Gun", "They Say It's Wonderful", "Anything You Can Do".

Plot Summary

When a travelling Wild West show visits her town, Annie Oakley enters a shooting contest, wins, and is asked to join the show. She has fallen in love with the star of the show, Frank Butler and agrees to join, although she has no idea what "show business" is - she is informed with the classic song, "There's No Business Like Show Business". Over the course of the musical, Frank although insisting that the girl he wants will "wear satin.....and smell of cologne" ("The Girl That I Marry"), becomes enamoured of the tomboyish Annie. Unfortunately, his ego is bruised and he becomes jealous when Annie becomes a star, and he walks out on her.

After various complications, which keep Annie and Frank apart, they come together again, only to have one last shooting duel in the finale - "Anything You Can Do". Annie deliberately loses to Frank to soothe his ego and they go off together. (In the 1999 revival, the match ends in a tie.)

Productions

1946 and 1947 Productions

Annie Get Your Gun was first staged on Broadway at the Imperial Theater on May 16th, 1946 and ran for 1,147 performances. Directed by Joshua Logan, Ethel Merman starred as Annie Oakley with Ray Middleton in the leading male role as Frank Butler. Foster Wilson was played by Art Barnett, Chief Sitting Bull was Harry Bellaver, Tommy Keeler was Kenneth Bowers, Charlie Davenport was Marty May and Buffalo Bill Cody was William O'Neal.

The show opened on the West End at the Coliseum on June 7th, 1947 and ran for 1,304 performances.

1999 Revival

With a revised book and new orchestrations, the 1999 revival had a pre-Broadway engagement from December 29th, 1998 to January 24th, 1999 at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Previews began on Broadway on February 2nd, 1999 at the Marquis theatre, with an offical opening date of March 4th 1999. This revival starred Bernadette Peters as "Annie" and Tom Wopat as "Frank Butler", with direction by Graciela Daniele and choreography by Jeff Calhoun. Peters won the 1999 Tony Award for Best Actress (Musical) and the production won the 1999 Tony Award for Best Revival of a Musical.

This production was structured as a "show-within-a-show" and opened with "Frank Butler" alone on stage introducing the main characters and singing "There's No Business Like Show Business", which is reprised when "Annie" agrees to join the traveling Wild West show. The production dropped several songs (including "Colonel Buffalo Bill", "I'm A Bad, Bad Man", and "I'm an Indian Too"), but included "An Old-Fashioned Wedding". There were several major dance numbers added, including one for "I Got the Sun in the Morning". A sub-plot, which had been dropped from the 1966 revival, involving the romance between Winnie, the young sister of Frank Butler's assistant and Tommy, her part-Native-American boyfriend was also included, and Winnie is Dolly's sister rather than her daughter.

- AIMS runs a residential workshop each Summer in Thurles for 15 to 18 year olds under the directorship of Peter Kennedy and Mary Rose McNally.

DAVID HENNESSY – Director

David has been involved in theatre from a very early age. He has been involved in nearly every local society in one capacity or another. MICHELLE CONDON - Choreographer

Michelle is one of the South East's leading choreographers and has worked with many different groups including Tops, Panto, Musicals, Cabarets etc

In 1998 she directed and choreographed *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat* for which she won the award of AIMS Best Choreographer and also received the WLRfm Arts and Entertainment Award. She has also directed *'Joseph'* and *'How to succeed in business without really trying'* for De La Salle College Musical Society and last year in 2007 she produced & choreographed their production of *'Jesus Christ Superstar.'*

Michelle has a long association with De La Salle Musical Society, on stage and Backstage, Last year she choreographed their highly acclaimed production of 'Annie'.



WAYNE BROWN - Musical Director

Wayne is delighted to be involved in this years production of "Annie Get Your Gun", as it is one of his favourite shows since being involved with another local production back in 1992 on the stage crew. A (thankfully for Waterford audiences) brief stage career followed where he specialised in playing inanimate objects, such as 'The Mountain' in De La Salle's award winning King and I. Since then he has gone on to work on the music end of things for every musical society in Waterford. Such as on shows as diverse as "The Little Shop of Horrors" to "West Side Story," from "A Chorus Line" to "Brigadoon".

With Premier Productions he was involved in six wins in eight years, in the Musical Cameo Section of the AIMS Choral Festival. Most recently, he enjoyed working on the music for "Into The Woods" that picked up the AIMS best overall show in last years awards.

There has also been a healthy dose of Variety shows and Panto down through the years. He would like to thank the De La Salle cast and crew for all their hard work on "Annie Get Your Gun", particularly over Christmas and January when it's never easy to come out and rehearse.

Irving Berlin

Surprisingly Irving Berlin (1888-1989) wasn't first choice as composer for "Annie Get Your Gun". Jerome Kern was going to provide music, with Dorothy Fields writing the lyrics. But then, in November 1945 Kern unexpectedly died. Despite 30 years as America's most popular songwriter, Berlin took some persuading to step into Kern's shoes. finally Berlin read the script, and within a week had roughed out four of the show's biggest hits: "Doin' What Comes Natur'lly, "You Can't Get A Man With A Gun", "They Say It's Wonderful" and "There's No business Like Show Business".

There was only one act at that time - a first draft called Annie Oakley. He read it and liked it very much but didn't think it was quite up his alley. He told Oscar how he felt and he was very understanding. He thought that was the end of it That week, on a Friday, Dick Rodgers telephoned and said "If you will do the score, I can get Josh Logan to direct it." That was an inducement because Josh had staged some of the numbers in *This is the Army.* He still was reluctant but Dick said, "Why don't you think about it over the weekend? He read the first act again and wrote two songs: "They Say it's Wonderful" and "Doin' What comes Natur'lly. He then met with Dick and Oscar on Monday but was still playing it very cautiously and asked to think it over another week Dick Rodgers, very rightly said "Why another week?"

Richard Rodgers

Since Dorothy Fields was a highly skilled lyricist, she naturally expected to collaborate on the score. Choosing a composer was easy; Oscar's friendship with Jerome Kern and his near idolatry of him dictated the selection. He mailed him a script and sent him a wire: IT WOULD BE ONE OF THE GREAT-EST HONOURS IN MY LIFE IF YOU WOULD CONSENT TO WRITE THE MUSIC FOR THIS SHOW. Once the shock of Jerry's death had faded, he and Oscar were faced with the problem of finding a composer to replace him on the Annie Oakley musical. Having already chosen Kern, they felt it was extremely important to get another composer of equal stature and his could only mean Irving Berlin. His songs were all brilliant and there was no further need to convince him that he could write the songs for *Annie Get Your Gun*. In fact, he was so grateful to Dorothy and Herb for the help their script had given him that he insisted that they recieve part of his percentage for the show. Generosity such as this is an exceedingly rare commodity.

Dorothy Fields

During the war, her late husband did volunteer work down at Penn Station for Traveller's AidOne of the ladies told him one night about a kid who'd just come in, a young soldier. Very drunk, he'd been to Coney Island and had kewpie dolls and lamps and every piece of junk you could possible win. How come? Across his chest, he had a row of sharpshooter's medals And as if out of the sky, from heaven, came this idea - Annie Oakley, the sharpshooter! It was the only time in her life that an idea came absolutely from God. She knew Oscar Hammerstein and Dick Rodgers were producing shows as well as writing them [and] she said, "Ockie, what do you think of Ethel Merman as Annie Oakley?" He said, "We'll do it". That's all! And then he said, "Talk to Dick," and Dick said the same thing - "We'll do it." They did a lot of research on Annie Oakley and Frank Butler and both of them apparently were about the dullest people in the world. Annie Oakley in real life used to sit in her tent and knit, for God's Sake. They were all sitting at a restaurant and started discussing whom they could possibly replace someone as gifted as Kern. And Dick finally said, "Well, I know somebody, but it means that Dorothy can't do the lyrics." She said, "I have enough to do with the book. I don't care, who is it?" And he said, "Irving." Well, we all thought that was fabulous.

A History of Annie Oakley

Phoebe Ann Mosey (often misspelled as Mozee or Moses) was born in a log cabin in Darke County, Ohio, in 1860. She fired her first shot at the age of eight and by age 12 was the chief provider for her large and hungry family. Thanks to her mastery of the rifle and shotgun, she paid off the mortgage on the Mosey homestead through the sale of surplus wild game to a Cincinnati hotel owner.

The fame of this amazing sharpshooter exploded throughout Ohio and the Midwest when she defeated Frank Butler, vaudeville's champion marksman and trick shot. Butler not only lost the match, he lost his heart to her. One year later, Frank and Annie were married. Frank felt certain husband and wife teams would face difficulty being booked by agents, and he and Annie decided that she should have a professional name. Annie chose 'Oakley' after a kind and generous person who had befriended her in an earlier time of

crisis. As Annie Oakley's fame grew, Frank realized his bride was attracting far more attention than he as she stunned audiences with her phenomenal accuracy. He soon brought her to the attention of Nate Salsbury, the genius manager of *Buffalo Bill's wild West Show.* Frank withdrew from the competition to concentrate on managing Annie's career.

Touring Europe with the Wild West Show in 1887, Annie twice gave private demonstrations for Queen Victoria, defeated Grand Duke Michael of Russia in a match arranged by the Prince of Wales, and in Berlin shot a cigarette from the lips of Kaiser Wilhelm. After a tragic train accident, Annie retired from the Wild West Show in 1901. She starred in a Broadway play, The Western Girl, in 1902 and '03. She also continued to perform at charity events - Annie Oakley never refused a charity request if the beneficiaries were either orphaned girls, deserving young women, or actors.

Annie Oakley's feats as a sharpshooter are legendary. At 30 paces she shot a dime from between her husband's thumb and forefinger with a .22 rifle and with this weapon could hit two-inch flying balls by sightging them in the shiny surface of a bowie knife. Once she shot 943 out of 1,000 flying balls in a rapid-fire demonstration and, at the age of 56. Using three doublebarelled guns, punctured in midair six balls sprung from as many traps. Her prowess was immortalized in the lingo of Broadway when, in the pre-computerized days of hard tickets, complimentary ticket's identified by the holes punched in them were called 'Annie Oaklies' since they duplicated the holes Annie shot in flying playing cards.

Annie Oakley died in Greenville, Ohio, on November 3rd, 1926. Frank butler died 18 days later. They were buried side-by-side in Brock Cemetery, just a few miles from her birthplace.

Buffalo Bill's Wild West

After being a frontiersman, Buffalo bill entered showbusiness. He formed a touring company called the Buffalo Bill Combination which put on plays (such as "Scouts of the Prairie", "Scouts of the Plain") based loosely on his western adentures, initially with Texas Jack Omohundro, and for one season (1873) with Wild Bill Hickok. The troupe toured for ten years and his part typically included an 1876 incident at the Warbonnet Creek where he claimed to have scalped a Cheyenne warrior, purportedly in revenge for the death of George Armstrong Custer.

It was the age of great showmen and travelling entertainers, like the Barnum and Bailey Circus and the Vaudeville circuits. Cody put together a new travelling show based on both of those forms of entertainment. In 1883 in the area of North Platte, Nebraska he founded "Buffalo Bill's Wild West," (despite popular misconception, the word "show" was not a part of the title) a circus-like attraction that toured annually. As the Wild West toured North America over the next twenty years, it became a moving extravaganza, including as many as 1,200 performers. In 1893 the title was changed to "Buffalo Bill's Wild West and Congress of Rough Riders of the World". The show began with a parade on horseback, with participants from horse-culture groups that included US and other military, American Indians, and performers from all over the world in their best attire. There were Turks, Gauchos, Arabs, Mongols and Cossacks, among others, each showing their own distinctive horses and colourful costumes. Visitors to this spectable could see main events, feats of skill, staged races, and sideshows. Many authentic western personalities were part of the show. For example Sitting Bull and a band of twenty braves appeared. Cody's headline performers were well known in their own right. People like Annie Oakley and her husband Frank Butler put on shooting exhibitions along with the likes of Gabriel Dumont. Buffalo Bill and his performers would re-enact the riding of the Pony Express, Indian attacks on wagon trains, and stagecoach robberies. The show typically ended with a melodramatic re-enactment of Custer's Last Stand in which Cody himself portrayed General Custer.


