Adjudicators:

BIDDY WHITE-LENNON

The career of one of our best-known younger actresses began in the old Peacock Theatre in a Jack Yeats play directed by Jack McGowran when she was four years old. The daughter of a famous 'literary' landlord (Tommy Lennon of the Abbey Bar next door to the National Theatre) and RIAM Professor of Speech and Drama (Ursula White), Biddy progressed from being dandled on the knee of every writer and actor of note from Jimmy O'Dea to Patrick Kavanagh (a Monaghan neighbour of her father's) to Drama college in England.

There she began a thriving career which embraced radio (Hancocks Half-hour) television, theatre and films. (St. Trinian's with Alastair Sim, Margaret Rutherford, George Cole and Joyce Grenfell, and Violent Playground with an equally youthful David McCallum). At fifteen she returned to Dublin for a single unpromising appearance as a young orphaned itinerant in an RTE Drama series tentatively called The Lees of Leestown. The rest is Irish Broadcasting history.

Today, as well as frequent theatre appearances in all the major venues, television and radio work, script writing, Biddy somehow finds time to write about food, manage a busy public relations schedule, run a video production company with her husband Denis Latimer, and manages a home. She is an experienced adjudicator at variety competitions and drama festivals and has adjudicated the John Player Tops at local level and was on the adjudication panel at last year's final.

MICHAEL TWOMEY

In the course of some 40 years experience in all aspects of theatre, from pantomime and revue to drama, including Shakespeare, Michael has won many awards including "Best Actor" for "Hamlet" in the sixties and a Jacobs award for Best Comedy on R.T.E T.V.

Probably best known as "Miah" in the comedy duo "Cha and Miah" through appearances over many years in Frank Hall programmes on television, he has tremendous depth of stage experience both as a performer and as a producer/director. He has produced and appeared in many plays in Cork and Dublin with Theatre of South Ltd., of which he is a director and he has co-written and produced numerous pantomimes and revues in the Cork Opera House and a wide range of productions for the Everyman Theatre, Cork.

He has a long association with the John Player Tops having produced the winning Tops show in Cork in 1971. Since then he has adjudicated frequently at local level and at all national stages. In addition he is in regular demand as an adjudicator for a wide range of theatrical and entertainment events.



As the John Player Tops is a competition it is only natural that patrons should tend to adjudicate the shows. This is healthy in that it encourages people to be analytical and to appreciate the numerous elements which go to make up a show. However adjudication should be objective and that is not always easy for patrons as invariably they have some association with one show or another! The real purpose of Tops is to encourage people to get together in a highly satisfying and creative activity for their own enjoyment and that of others. It is only the competitive element which requires comparisons between shows. But each show is an achievement and a success in its own right and those involved merit our appreciation and acclaim for what they have accomplished irrespective of the heights scaled by others. It is right that groups should strive towards high standards and that they should be appropriately congratulated on attaining them. But those who achieve lesser standards should not be dismissed. When all is said and done those who participate in Tops are part-timers, often with no previous theatrical experience, and they deserve encouragement and appreciation for their commitment and effort. So by all means adjudicate but do so objectively and with an understanding of the essence of Tops. And enjoy yourself - that is the main purpose of being here tonight!
